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SUMMARY

Senate Bill 44 (Alexandra's Law) will require that a written advisory or admonishment be issued to a person convicted of a fentanyl-related drug offense notifying the person of the danger of manufacturing and distributing controlled substances and of potential future criminal liability if another person dies as a result of that person's actions. It will also require that a fentanyl-related defendant be referred to drug court or drug treatment programs, if applicable.

BACKGROUND/EXISTING LAW

With respect to deaths resulting from DUIs, the **California Supreme Court** held in *People v*. *Watson (1981), 30 Cal.3d 290, 298*, in affirming a second-degree murder conviction, that "when the conduct in question can be characterized as a wanton disregard for life, and the facts demonstrate a subjective awareness of the risk created, malice may be implied."

To codify this notion, **California Vehicle Code** §23593 was implemented in 2004 to require that courts read an admonishment to anyone convicted of reckless driving or Driving Under the Influence (DUI) to inform them of the state's ability and intent to charge a repeated future offense with manslaughter or murder.

make it unlawful to sell, traffic, or transport specified opiates.

NEED FOR THE BILL

Sadly, synthetic opioids were responsible for the majority of drug related deaths in 2021. Specifically, fentanyl was the number one cause of death last year for people ages 18-45, outpacing suicides and COVID-19.

Fentanyl causes a fatality every 7 minutes, and is linked to 64% of total drug fatalities.

It is believed that fentanyl-specific admonishments have been individually adopted by at least 38 out California's 58 counties.

SOLUTION

SB 44 introduces the California Fentanyl Admonishment, otherwise known as Alexandra's Law, modeled after the state's current DUI Advisory.

The admonishment required by SB 44 will help law enforcement and prosecutors establish implied malice in cases of drug-induced death resulting from fentanyl sold or furnished by a previouslyconvicted dealer or trafficker.

The mechanism created in SB 21 also seeks to maximize both drug treatment and rehabilitation opportunities for Californians involved in the drug trade.
